<p>These results evidence that our children in receipt of pupil premium significantly outperform their peers in other schools, based on the national average. Nonetheless, there remains a gap between children within school who are in receipt, and those who are not at Key Stage 1. There is no significant gap for the phonics screening of GLD.</p> <p style="text-align: center;">The focus for 2018/19 is therefore to narrow the gap at end of KS1 assessments.</p>
